Re: Disposition Category and Disposition in MEDS for AMA, RAS, cancelation, treat and refer, and transfer of care to BLS PCRs

Page 5: Treat and Refer


Page 6: Transfer of Care to BLS




AMA

If you have arrived on-scene, make patient contact, and the patient wishes to AMA, the AMR paramedic on-scene must complete the AMA paperwork. As the transporting agency, if the patient is refusing transport, we need thorough documentation of their refusal. The Disposition Category and Disposition may be either *No Treatment No Transport* and *AMA*, or *Treat No Transport* and *AMA*, depending on what care, if any, was rendered to the patient.







RAS

If you have arrived on-scene, make contact with an individual who does not have an illness or injury requiring transport to the hospital, and the individual does not wish to be transported to the hospital, a paramedic or EMT on-scene must complete the RAS paperwork. The Disposition Category and Disposition may be either *No Treatment No Transport* and *Non-Injury*, or *Treat No Transport* and *Treated and Released, NO AMA*, depending on what care, if any, was rendered to the individual.

Treat No Transport and Treated and Released








Cancelations

If you have arrived on-scene, have not made patient contact, and are canceled by an ALS fire department, law enforcement, et cetera, you must complete a PCR detailing what agency you were canceled by, the reason for the cancelation, and that you made no patient contact. The Disposition Category and Disposition should be *Cancel On Scene-No Pt Contact* and *Canc By ALS Fire*, *Canc by Law Enforcement*, et cetera.

Cancel On Scene-No Pt Contact and Canc By ALS Fire, Canc by Law Enforcement, et cetera








Treat and Refer

In accordance with Contra Costa Health Services Administrative Bulletin No. 20-BUL-007, Treat and Refer has been expanded to allow for the referral of all low acuity patients who do not require emergency department care to alternative health care venues. The Disposition Category and Disposition should be *Treat No Transport* and *Treated and Released, NO AMA*. It is a requirement that you document in the narrative of your PCR that the individual was provided with a copy of "CoCo EMS Treat and Refer Resources," and "where" they were referred to seek medical attention, i.e. "After a thorough ALS assessment the patient was determined to be low acuity, given a copy of "CoCo EMS Treat and Refer Resources," and referred to seek medical attention from either their PCP or La Clinica."

Transfer of care to BLS

During periods in which AMR BLS resources are deployed in the 9-1-1 system, an AMR paramedic may transfer care of a patient determined to be low acuity to an AMR BLS unit. The Disposition Category and Disposition should be *Treat No Transport* and *Transport By Other AMR*. It is advised that you document in the narrative of your PCR that the patient was determined to be low acuity and BLS level of care is appropriate, i.e. "After a thorough ALS assessment the patient was determined to be low acuity, with no foreseeable need for ALS interventions, and appropriate for BLS transport to the hospital."
